Sowing Seeds, Saving Souls, and Molding Men

What do you do when your guest speaker has to cancel at the last minute for health reasons? Simply put, you utter a quick prayer, trust God, and speak from the heart.

That's exactly what happened - and what I did - at a recent Living H2O Initiative. Since I had no time to prepare a message, I felt that

God wanted me to share about an experience I had just had a few minutes earlier.

Walking into a local CVS drug store to pick up some cases of bottled water, I noticed a large man in his early 30s getting ready to check out. There was nothing out of the ordinary

about him except for his attire... or lack thereof. You see, not only were his pants below his rump, but all of his underwear - and at least half of his bare backside - were on display for all to see.

As I lined up behind him at the self-checkout counter, I decided to say something. "Hey brother," I began, "you need to pull your pants up."

Turning to me with an annoyed look on his face, the man responded with a sneer, "First, I'm not your brother."

"Well, you still need to pull your pants up," I replied. "There are ladies here and they don't need to see that." Offering a condescending

smile, the man extended his hand - which I shook - and promptly pulled up his pants.

As I glanced over at the store manager, a middle-aged woman who was closely monitoring the situation, I saw her mouth the words, "Thank you" at me. She then directed me to a live checkout counter where she waited on me personally... and thanked me once again.

And so, that is how I began my halftime devotional message before a packed gym of

young men in their teens and early twenties. "Before I start," I said, "I want you all to say, 'Dale is a dinosaur." They laughed and complied, waiting to see what was coming next.

"You guys know how much I care about you and how badly I want to see you trust Jesus Christ as your

Savior," I told them. "But I also want you to succeed in life and part of success is dressing properly, speaking articulately, and acting responsibly."

After sharing my CVS story with them, I commended them for the simple fact that I rarely have to ask any of them to pull their pants up at our program. "Whether you do it because it's the rules... or because you respect me... or you realize that this church gym is as much God's house as the sanctuary across the parking lot, I applaud your behavior."

From there, I spoke about the importance of staying in school and getting a good education, landing a good job and working hard at it so they get promoted, developing good

credit, and becoming productive members of society. I also stressed the importance of treating women with respect, which included not using profanity in their presence or getting them pregnant outside of marriage.

Sure, a few of them giggled, but the vast majority hung on my every word. I then talked about how much Godgiven potential they all possessed and how badly I wanted to see them use it for His glory. I finished by assuring them of my love, after which I explained God's plan of salvation, encouraging them to surrender their lives to Jesus Christ.

When I was done, they erupted in applause.

Shortly afterwards, one young man approached me and said, "Thanks for your speech. I'm really trying."

"I know," I replied, "and you really do have a lot of potential."

Then another young man came up to me to share some good news. "I just bought a house," Jerry told me excit-

edly. "Good for you, Jerry!" I said, asking him for more details.

Jerry has been attending our Living H2O Initiative since he was in middle school, which was about seven or eight years ago. He has since graduated from high school and went to work for an air-conditioning company. Now, having diligently saved part of his salary, he was a





first-time homeowner and couldn't wait to tell me about it.

"I wish I could come out more often," Jerry said, "but I usually work on my new house every night until 8 p.m."

"I understand completely," I told Jerry, "and I couldn't be prouder of you."

And that, my friends, is what our Living H2O Initiative is all about: sowing seeds, saving souls, and molding men.

"In the world you will have tribulation."

Are you asking why this should be, believer? Look upward to your heavenly Father, and behold Him pure and holy. Do you know that you are one day to be like Him? Will you easily be conformed to His image? Will you not require much refining in the furnace of affliction to purify you? Will it be an easy thing to get rid of your corruptions and make you perfect even as your Father in heaven is perfect?

If it is, then you are not God's friend, for whoever is the friend of the world is the enemy of God. Be certain that you will find enemies everywhere. When you sleep, remember that you are resting on the battlefield; when you travel, suspect an ambush in every hedge. As mosquitoes are said to bite strangers more than natives, so the trials of earth will be sharpest to you.

Lastly, look within you, into your own heart, and observe what is there. Sin and self are still within. If you had no devil to tempt you, no enemies to fight you, and no world to ensnare you, you would still find in yourself enough evil to be a sore trial to you, for "the heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick." Expect trouble then, but do not despair on account of it, for God is with you to help and to strengthen you. He has said, "call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me.".
